

Adult School Office Class Held Tonight

A new, free course in office practice and business English, to serve as a brush-up for secretaries, stenographers, and office workers, will be held each Thursday night at 8 o'clock in room 205 of Torrance High school.

It is open to all adults regardless of residence and is held by instructor Mack Landar, who regularly conducts the typing and shorthand classes at the Torrance Adult school.

Adults will learn the forms used in the business office, the spelling, punctuation, and grammar, and current filing systems now used in industry.

This class is run in conjunction with the adult typing class. "Both beginning and advanced office workers are welcome to join, since instruction is mainly on an individual basis," Landar said. "Students can proceed as fast as their background and ambition take them."

Those planning to attend the class should plan to attend the next meeting tonight at Torrance High School in room 205, Landar announced.

MOOSE PLANS BENEFIT FOR YOUNGSTERS

The Loyal Order of Moose of Southern California and the Los Angeles Rams are joining hands to stage the second annual "Operation Football," with a goal to taking 35,000 boys and girls to the Rams-Lions game in the Coliseum on Sunday, Dec. 9th, George Powell, governor of the Torrance Lodge, announced this week.

Powell revealed that the lodge Civic Affairs committee of Merle Cook, Louis Briganti, R. P. Pendleton and Joe Platt is already making plans for the local fraternity to participate in this Southern California Moose activity. Arrangements have been made to transport the boys and girls by Torrance Municipal buses to the game.

Originated last year, "Operation Football" delivered over 5,000 youngsters to the Coliseum with only three weeks of preparatory work. This year, William John, business manager of the Rams, and John F. Carter, vice president of the California Moose Association have set a minimum goal of 35,000 young guests.

Based on a youth welfare idea, the "Operation Football" allows each Moose or other ticket purchaser to take five youngsters between the ages of 8 and 14 to the game as guests with the purchase of a two dollar ticket. Tickets may be obtained from officers of the Moose and members of the civic affairs committee.

Two hundred or more children from this city are expected to board the Torrance buses at 12:30 p. m. in front of the Carson street Moose lodge on Sun., Dec. 9th — Destination: "Operation Football."
