

KILLMAN TAKES TRIP TO FORMOSA IN FEBRUARY

The island of Formosa will be the destination of Reverend Russ Killman when he leaves February 2nd, on a missionary tour. The Reverend has been granted a two month leave of absence by the First Baptist Church where he has served as pastor for the past 3 years.

In part this worthwhile endeavor is being sponsored by two diamonds generously donated by an elderly Torrance lady.

Youth For Christ is sponsoring the tour and Reverend Killman's activities will include delivering four sermons each day to student groups on the island.

On his arrival on the island Killman will receive a letter of introduction from Casl Woo, governor of Formosa. This letter will be presented to the principals of the high schools and colleges. The sermons will be delivered to the assembled students through an interpreter.

Reverend Killman will preach also to Chiang Kai-Shek's 6,000-000 Free China soldiers.

Youth For Christ is sponsoring extensive evangelist activities on this tiny island, whose inhabitants number ten million.

Reverend Killman's trip has been made possible through the generous donations of his congregation and of business and professional people of Torrance. The Reverend announced that some additional funds are needed.

The trip by plane will take Killman to Honolulu, Guam, Wake, and Manila. He said that the return trip would be the northern route and include Okinawa, Japan, Alaska and Seattle. Reverend Killman is talented as a singer and trumpet player and says that this will be very useful to him over there.

Carson Street P-TA Spanish Dinner Held




