## El Camino College Ends Casaba Hoop Schedule With Two Wins

CAMINO COLLEGE . . . 2 - 24 El Camino College's barnstorming basketball team wound up its annual Northern trip last week with a two win and four loss record.

Coach Tom Bailey's Warriors pent six days up North and stayed in the cities of Sacramento and San Francisco while engaging such opponents as Grant Technical, Sacramento City College, Vallejo, San Francisco C. C., San Mateo, and Marin College.

The Camino eagles opened their trip last Tuesday night with a narrow 50 to 48 victory over Grant Tech. After leading throughout the contest the Warriors stalled late Grant Tech. rally and won the tilt by two points.

Forward Bob Ross led the winners with 15 points. Guard Dick Row followed with 14 digits of runner-up honors. Forward Hiro Kubo hit for nine markers, Guard Willie Shea garnered eight allies and Center Mike Stellino ounded out the scoring with four joints.

EDGED OUT Wednesday evening the Blue and Grey hoopers were edged out 59 to 61 by a strong Sacramento J. C. quintet. Tied up with 40 seconds left in the game, the Panthers dropped in the winning field goal for their two point victory.

Ross led the Caminitos with 21 points and Mike Stellino hit the neshes for 14 digits.

Coach Bailey used his entire quad in trouncing Vallejo J. C. 83 to 72 Thursday night on the osers court. Once again it was Ross who led the Camino scorers. The jump shot artist hit for 24 lights but was out-shone by the osers center, Chet Carr. Carr set a new Vallejo school scoring record when he tallied 42 points.

San Francisco C. C. provided the opposition for the Warriors Friday night and handed the locals 155 to 40 loss. Stellino and Carr led the losers with 10 points each.

The El Camino group played

their fifth game in a row Saturday evening and lost out to San Mateo 74 to 66. Forward Wayne Scholl was high scorer for the Warriors with 24 points. Forward Ervin Bonner was the big gun for the winners with 21 digits. Bonner connected on several "impossible" shots and caused the Warriors their biggest headache.

77 TO 33 LOSS

The Blue and Grey contingent wound up their Northern visit with a 77 to 73 loss against Marin College. The Marin quintet led during the entire game but the Warriors clipped a 20 point Marin lead down to 3 points during the final minutes of play.

Ross once again led the losers with 23 markers while Shea tallied 15 points and Guard Jack Fitzgerald hit for 10 digits.

During the trip Ross was the over all high point man with 90 points for five games and an 18 point average. The high scoring forward sat out one game with severe blisters on his heel.

The Warriors tallied 371 points to their opponents 387 during the six games. In the free throw department the Warriors hit for 73 out of an attempted 116 gratis tosses for a .629 percentage. The Warriors opponents tallied 97 out of an attempted 152 for a .631 pct.

## El Camino Official Dies In Surgery

Don Hall Frame, 39, popular El Camino College Division Head and Instructor died suddenly last Friday following surgery at St. Vincent's Hospital, Los Angeles.

An Assistant Director of Student Personnel and an Instructor in Commercial subjects, Frame has been connected with the local institution since establishment of the college in 1947. He received his bachelor of Business Administration degree from the University of Washington in 1934 and his master's degree from the same institution in 1939. He had also taken post-graduate training at U.C.L.A. During World War II he was Commanding Officer of the Navy College Training program at Whitman College, Walla Walla, Washington and later became Personnel Officer of the Naval Unit at the University of California.

Two years ago he was stricken with polio and spent more than a year in an iron lung and had but recently resumed his duties at the college as official in charge of Guidance and Student Placement. He is survived by his wife, Eileen, and three sons, Richard 9, Thomas 8, and William 5.

Funeral services were conducted at Wee Kirk of the Heather, Forest Lawn.
