meeting, quoted in public print. Dale was unable to get a promise that the dump will be closed in a year.

The City Manager has picked 17 possible sites for a new dump.

Yet the digging, the burying of filth, the rats, the vermin and the generally unhealthful conditions still exist, and will continue to exist until a NEW CITY COUNCIL gets action.

The only way to get action to remove the city dump to a place away from children and homes is to elect the "BID for Better Government" ticket.

STAGNANT WATER

Councilman Dale has urged that something be done about the flooded conditions in the Wateria area, and has supported the plan of former City Engineer Jacob Joseph for draining the area.

Candidates on the "Bid for Better Government" ticket have offered a plan for converting the area west of Hawthorne boulevard between Pacific Coast Highway and Sepulveda boulevard into a vast recreation, water conservation and flood control area. Both ideas have met the "deaf ears of our four Council members."

Now, in public print in the metropolitan papers is the story of the danger of typhoid because the present city government has failed to act on the flood control and stagnant water menace. We reprint here an article on the subject in the Examiner March 31.

TORRANCE, March 29.—With typhoid fever seen as a threatening health menace, residents in the Meadow Park district today awaited relief from accumulated flood waters covering nearly a square mile in the area.

John Todd, 22704 Ocean avenue, said portions of his farm still are under water nearly two feet deep since the last rainstorm.

Residents will appeal to Torrance health authorities for typhoid immunization shots for their children.

Fumping of stagnant water he said, was started yesterday in areas across the street from his farm under direction of city authorities.

Heavy adobe topsoil and a four-foot strip of hardpan below retards seepage of the water into the ground.

Torrance city officials say a constructive drainage project will have to be deferred until results of tapping experiments in the area are studied.

Residents point out that stagnant waters have become ripe breeding places for mosquitoes and a menace to children in the district.

"Last January, the rains just about flooded us out," said Todd's wife, Ruth. "Before it had a chance to drain off, the new storm hit and finished the job."

Some roads leading into the district are impassable and a few families were compelled to evacuate.

Planting of crops has been

delayed. County engineers are interested in a long range drainage project, the Todds were informed.




