Riviera Suit Wins Change In School's Architecture

The suit in which the Hollywood Riviera Community Association is attempting to stop construction of a private school in that area came to trial early this week. Albert Trier, principal of the one-story concrete-block school, and the Community Association were advised by Judge David Coleman of the Inglewood Superior Court, to get together and work out their differences. Judge Coleman recommended that changes should be made in the school so that it conformed with the architectural styles demanded by deed restrictions of that area. Principals in the suit are expected to follow the judge's suggestions. It was brought out in the suit that Trier did not submit the plans for his South Bay Christian School to the Art Jury in the area before starting construction.
