

County Nods Flood Project

Four flood control projects totaling \$1,180,000 for Torrance were approved by the county board of supervisors for inclusion in a proposed \$160,000,000 bond issue election according to Supervisor Raymond V. Darby. They were recommended to the board of city officials and county flood control district engineers. A decision as to when, if at all, an election is to be called is expected later this month, Darby said.

Keystone Gets Aid Stations

Five first aid stations will be set up in the area in first aid and spotted throughout the Keystone-Dominguez area to serve the 27,000 persons here in the event of domestic disaster or foreign attack, Dr. Harold S. Johnson, medical director for the county, announced today.

GAS RATES FALL SHORT

F. M. Banks, president, Southern California Gas Co., today made the following statement in regard to an interim gas rate increase granted by the Public Utilities Commission to take effect on April 10, 1952.

The interim gas rate increase of \$4,890,000, granted by the Public Utilities Commission, while a step in the right direction, still falls short of meeting the heavy increased costs we have incurred since our first rate boost in 1950. Three major items alone, which are real and beyond dispute, amount to nearly \$10 million a year. These include wage increases of 13 percent; a 90 percent increase in the cost of gas purchased by use for resale; and an increase in come tax rates from 38 to 52 percent.
