Any candidate for Judge of the Municipal Court or similar office of responsibility should welcome a thorough check of his background and experience, Judge Otto B. Willett told a group of citizens gathered for the El Nido Civic Association's regular meeting this week.

Judge Willett, candidate for office no. 2 of the new South Bay Municipal Court, was asked how best the record of a candidate for such an office might be checked, since the average voter has no direct contact with judges and thus is at loss when faced with their names on the ballot.

CANDIDATE QUALIFICATION

"There are large numbers of persons who work constantly with judges, and they can give impartial information to interested voters. Lawyers appear before judges every day, and as a result are capable of giving the public facts about the judicial ability and impartiality of a judge. I suggest you ask your lawyer, in such a case.

EFFICIENCY—Members of the Sheriff's department, police officers and others who work closely with the courts and know the ability of a judge can be questioned," Judge Willett continued. "Court attaches, clerks, bailiffs, reporters and others observe daily the degree of efficiency and justice meted out by the judges in whose courts they serve. Antiquated Election Laws Hit by Darby

County Supervisor Raymond V. Darby has launched a vigorous attack against antiquated election laws which he said are costing taxpayers hundreds of thousands of dollars a year.

In an address before members of the Harbor area Masonic order, Supervisor Darby said: "It costs a million dollars every time we hold a primary and general election in our county. And every time we hold a small local election, the cost mounts. We have nearly 200 local elections a year in the county."

On constant alert to cut down unnecessary government expense Supervisor Darby urged that the 124 state election laws be changed.

"By combining local elections with primary and general elections every two years, the county could save hundreds of thousands

of dollars each year — and that would be money ahead for the taxpayer," Supervisor Darby said.

The fighting Fourth District supervisor said he would continue working on the problem of consolidation of small elections.
