**Urge Heavy Donation In Blood Drive**

The Red Cross bloodmobile will visit the Torrance Civic Auditorium on October 6, from 3 p.m. to 7:30 p.m., to recruit life-giving donations of blood for the wounded of Korea and local civilian hospitals.

So announced Mrs. Don Hyde and Mrs. Mel Howard, co-chairman of the blood bank committee yesterday in a message urging all local citizens to sign up now for appointments to meet the mobile. Appointments to donate blood "To save lives of wounded Americans overseas" can be made by calling Torrance 3447 or 3448.

**Urgent Need Told**  
 "Our blood is urgently needed now," the local chairman said. "In addition to setting up accounts in life-giving blood against which we and our immediate families may draw in an emergency, our donations through the Red Cross mean that battlefield surgeons in Korea will have blood for wounded GIs."

Mesdames Hyde and Howard underscored the necessity of making an appointment for the donation. "The Los Angeles Regional blood service is operating at the very limit of its facilities in staff and equipment to meet the vastly expanded need for blood and blood derivatives," the chairmen declared. "Furthermore, the highly perishable nature of whole blood makes it imperative that the Red Cross fill completely every quota."

"Were we to fall short of doing our share, the deficit could not be made up."  
**Donor Requirements**  
 Donor requirements are: persons 21 to 60 years of age may donate. Minors 18 to 21 years of age can donate but must bring written permission from their parents. (This slip may be obtained from the Red Cross office, 1754 Torrance boulevard). Married female minors may sign their own release. Donors must weigh at least 110 pounds. According to California state law a person may donate every 12 weeks.

**Dr. J. Comroe Heads Torrance Health District**

The appointment of Dr. Jules Comroe as Health Officer for the Torrance Health District was announced this week by Dr. Roy O. Gilbert, Los Angeles County Health Officer.

Dr. Comroe has been serving in that capacity since his return to the department after a two-year military leave for service in Okinawa. He had formerly seen army service from 1941 to 1946.

Dr. Comroe was Health Officer for the Inglewood District in 1950, having been assigned to that post after a year's service at Santa Monica. Prior to that he had worked for two years with the California State Health Dept.

He was born in Chicago and is a graduate of the University of Chicago School of Medicine, serving his internship at the County General Hospital here from 1936-38. He has also had post graduate study at both the University of California and Johns Hopkins University. Dr. Comroe is a Diplomate of the National Board and a member of the San Francisco City and County Medical Society.

**Harbor Tech. Extends Night Class Enrollment**

Registration for some 50 classes being offered in the extended (late afternoon and night) program at Harbor Junior College during the current semester will be permitted until Sept. 26, Harold A. McCarter, extended day coordinator, said today.

Courses open to enrollment in the Applied Technology division include Offset Photography, Alternating Current, Auxiliary Electrical Systems, Engine Electrical Systems, Engine Shop, Foods and Nutrition, Instrument Shop, Steam Power, Plant Operation, Machine Shop, Refining Processes, Advanced Refining Chemistry, Petroleum Processing, Advanced Petroleum Processing, Print Shop, Radar, Radio Fundamentals, Radio Shop, Typewriter Repair, and Television Shop.

Business Education courses still open include Accounting Principles, Business Law, Foremanship Training, Personnel Management, Machine Bookkeeping, Key Driven Calculating Machines, Typewriting and Shorthand.

Courses in the Construction and Art Technology division include Art Structure, Perspective and Freehand Drawing, Creative Ceramics, Life Drawing, Marine Navigation, Celestial Navigation, and General Blueprint Reading and Drafting.

Humanities division courses held open include Humanities and World Cultures, and Orchestra, while Natural Science division courses include Introduction to Vocational Nursing and Elementary Life Science.

Social Science division courses still open include Sociology, Child Psychology, U. S. History, Office Methods and Procedures; and five police science classes, Vehicle Code, Evidence, Juvenile Procedure, Police Supervision, and Narcotics.

All Tech late afternoon and night classes are tuition-free and open to any person 18 years of age or older, McCarter stated.


The Boulder Dam, which harnesses the waters of the Colorado River, is considered one of the wonders of the modern world.
