### Training Project Slated by YWCA

"We are very happy to inform you that your Association is one of the five in the Western Region selected to hostess one of the delegates of the YWCA International Leadership Training Project," said Mrs. Walter A. Gordon, project chairman for the Western Region, in a letter to the Board of Directors of the Harbor District YWCA.

"The delegate," she went on to state, "will not be here for formal training, but for the opportunity to live and work in a local YWCA in a community which is a part of the national scene."

"This project," Mrs. C. R. Halfpenny, president of the Board of Directors, states, "will bring 20 leaders from Asia, Africa and the Middle East to this country for a nine month work-study course beginning in October, when they will take special on-the-job training in international relations and social welfare work. As a result they will carry back to their own countries a fuller understanding and know-how of the techniques of democracy."

The 20 women will meet for a two-week orientation period in New York, then go to various communities in this country to observe and participate in the YWCA's program. This project is made possible by a grant of \$98,500 from the Ford Foundation to the National YWCA. The YW in this country through its foreign division is providing aid to other Y's in 27 countries overseas, it was reported.

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
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
