"We have been in our Torrance YWCA building one year today," said Mrs. Charlotte Lukes, YWCA Branch Director at the meeting of the Torrance Branch committee on administration held November 18.

"Many activities have been carried out which would not have been possible without this building," Mrs. Lukes continued. "One of the activities which has served a large number of teen agers has been the series of five after game dances held in recent weeks. During the past year Y-teen clubs have used the building for slumber parties, pot luck suppers, and candle light recognition ceremonies in addition to its constant use as a meeting place," she stated.

"During the year the YWCA as a membership organization has become more real to its members as the first annual meeting of the Torrance Branch was held here."
