Methodist Building Fund Dinner Attracts 600 Guests

More than 600 members and their guests were in attendance Tuesday evening, when the First Methodist Church staged a dinner meeting to disclose plans for the construction of an educational building for the church.

With Judge Willett presiding, the men of the church described in short speeches the Building Fund Canvass. Mayor M. M. Schwab, Lay Leader of the church, called attention to the fact that the churches had not kept pace with growth of the city. He expressed concern that all other advancement would be in danger if we neglected to build Christian character in our youth. Dr. Kurt Shery, member of the Building Committee, described the place of the church in the community. The Church School Superintendent, Maurice Ransom, pointed out that the need for rooms for church school was desperate, in the fact that there were only six good rooms to accommodate an enrollment of nearly six hundred. Bob Reid, chairman of the Building Committee, spoke of the plan of the church to erect the three-story building with rooms for Nursery, Kindergarten, Primary, and Junior children. One floor is to be a dining hall accommodating two hundred and thirty persons. A larger sanctuary is to be built on the corner at a later date, permitting the present one to serve as a social hall.

60-Man Team
The plan of the Canvass, as revealed by Art Sielaff, Chairman of the Official Board, is to ask each member and friend of the church to set aside a generous and sacrificial portion of his income each week for 150 weeks. There are sixty men working on the Canvass team, and through them they will solicit among the membership and constituency. It was stressed that there will be no public solicitation, but the Canvass will be a sharing witness, each family with the next.

Prayer Pledge
Lester Foster called the attention of the guests to the need for prayer to lead and guide the movement. Many members signed a prayer pledge, signifying their willingness to be in prayer at the hour of six each evening, for the success of the venture. Denis Behen directed the signing of the attendance card.

The closing message of Rev. John L. Taylor stressed the assurance of victory coming in response to the great interest of the community, as well as the members of the church. It was pointed out that many guests were not members, but were interested in the building because of its service to children and youth. Within the Canvass teams there are many loyal friends who have come to Torrance in the last few months, Rev. Taylor pointed out.

"Our children have a right to know Jesus," Rev. Taylor said

in his closing remarks, "and if we give them everything else in life, and do not give them Christian character, we will have failed. I can see your response in being here, and in the response of the many men who have given hours to this project, that Torrance is determined to become a balanced city with proper facilities for the training of children and youth in Christianity."
