Tighter Measures for Torrance Port Pilots

From now on the city ordinance prohibiting landing behind the white safety line on the Torrance Municipal Airport will be strictly enforced and violators punished, according to a recommendation made by the California Aeronautics Commission and accepted by Edward Dietrich, operator of the airport, at a hearing held Monday in the Torrance court room.

John Felton Turner, chairman of the Commission, said that the Commission would send a strong letter telling of the housing hazards to all nearby airports using the Torrance facilities. A diagram and photo of the landing pattern and landing area will be included. This information, which will go out in a week, will be sent out periodically after that as part of a continuous safety campaign.

Nothing was done at this time about compulsory insurance for aviators.

Mrs. Victoria Phillips, chairman of the Lomita Property Owners' Association, was spokesman for a number of residents who have been anywhere from annoyed to injured by planes using the Torrance airport. The members contended that only half-way measures were taken by whomsoever they had appealed to.

Sylvester Morning, a partner in the firm proposing to subdivide the land, asserted that the tract in question is one of the few really desirable tracts remaining in this city for home development. He stated that a tract such as his firm proposes cannot get adequate financing unless the site is attractive and will maintain its value.

Second Hearing
Following protests by the industrialists, the planning commission president closed the hearing. A second hearing on the matter has been set for May 6, at 8 p.m., in the commission chambers.

Meanwhile, an application for the 314-home tract slated for the 55-acre site is being held up pending the outcome of the second hearing.
