Appeal Made For Expanded Advertising

R. I. Plomert, president of the Chamber of Commerce, submitted a request for \$10,000 at Monday's chamber meeting for the purpose of increased advertising of the city of Torrance on a national scale, it was reported.

The advertising would appear in manufacturers' trade journals, manufacturing conventions, and direct mailing. The money would also go towards providing new maps and brochures telling of Torrance. Because of the rapid growth of the city, the map of the city will be printed twice instead of just once a year, it was announced.

Last year's traffic toll of deaths and injuries was the heaviest in history.

County Road Allocations Announced

Robert C. Kirkwood, State Controller, announced today that for the quarter ended March 31, 1953, \$61,994,578 has been allocated for the construction and improvement of city, county and state highways. The sum is the quarterly distribution from the Highway Users Tax Fund and is an increase of about 10 per cent over the same period in 1952.

Of this allocation, the cities will receive \$5,389,020; the counties, \$13,932,207; and the balance of \$42,673,351 will be deposited in the State Highway Fund.

Kirkwood reported that the Gasoline Tax raised \$38,800,941 of the amount distributed, with Motor License and Weight Fees accounting for \$18,687,319. The remainder came from Use (diesel) Fuel Tax, \$2,006,527; Transportation Tax, \$2,413,788; and miscellaneous revenues, \$86,003.

Of the total amount, Kirkwood said, Los Angeles County will receive \$4,332,720 which is to be used for construction and maintenance on the county road system.

Lloyd Desmond, chairman of the carnival committee, said plans for the program now include a ground breaking ceremony for the Avalon Village branch post office, plus street dancing for Teenagers, and the usual carnival rides and attractions.

Desmond said he hoped to complete the program by late this week, including the list of notables who will be on hand.

Climax of the entire affair comes Friday evening when the Queen will be crowned.
