**Inadequate Parks**  
 Pointing out that the commission has spent nearly \$150,000 in the past three years on nothing more than a few completely inadequate parks and an insufficient program, he declared that it would be absolutely ridiculous to spend more than \$60,000 annually under the present set-up.  
 A strong advocate of a joint city-school recreation program, Sues said that only under the joint administration could adequate recreation be provided for a reasonable sum.

**Tax Expert**  
 Robert I. Plomert, Torrance Chamber of Commerce president and GP tax expert, stated yesterday that he is opposed to any increase in taxes for recreation purposes. He asserted that such a special levy is unsound and unwarranted at this time.

**Swimming Pool**  
 While asking for the special ten cent tax, the Recreation Commission also asked the City Council to place a \$300,000 bond issue for a swimming pool on next April's municipal election ballot. Although the Council has agreed to place the measure on the ballot, keen observers have declared that if the schools and city were to combine their financial resources and build a giant pool for use by both the schools and the city, a great deal of money can be saved for individual tax-payers.

Councilman Nick Draie, who opposes granting a special tax for recreation, moved that the matter be referred to the city budget meetings, which are scheduled for next month.
