Telephone Tips

In preparation for the changeover to dial operation here at 12:01 a.m. Sunday, Torrance Telephone Manager R. S. Pyle gave the following tips on dial usage for FAirfax subscribers:

1. Know the correct number to be dialed by consulting the new telephone directory supplement.
2. Wait for the dial tone before calling.
3. Dial each letter and number correctly, distinguishing between the numeral "0" and the letter "O," and between the numeral "1" and the letter "L."
4. Let the dial return at its own speed.
5. Dial "113" for information.
6. Dial "114" for telephone repair service.
7. Dial "116" or the operator for the fire department, police, ambulance service, or the sheriff.

BLOOD UNIT WILL VISIT TORRANCE

The Red Cross bloodmobile will visit the Torrance Civic Auditorium June 8, 1953, 3 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. to recruit life-giving donations of blood for the wounded of Korea and local civilian hospitals.

So announced Mrs. Gordon S. Jones, Blood Recruitment chairman, yesterday in a message urging all local citizens to sign up now for appointments to meet the mobile. Appointments to donate blood "to save lives of wounded Americans overseas" can be made by calling Torrance 3447 or 3448.

Mrs. Jones underscored the necessity of making an appointment for the donation. In some cases, she said, it will be necessary for prospective donors to accept less than the most desirable hour.

"The Los Angeles Regional blood service is operating at the very limit of its facilities in staff and equipment to meet the vastly expanded need for blood and blood derivatives," Mrs. Jones declared. "Furthermore, the highly perishable nature of whole blood make it imperative that the Red Cross fill completely every quota."

"Were we to fall short of doing our share, the deficit could not be made up." This bloodmobile is sponsored by the Torrance Branch of Red Cross manned solely by volunteers. Local clubs wishing to form a participating group are urged to do so. Ten or more men and women may start a new group and may enroll by contacting Mrs. Jones or W. A. Felker, branch chairman.

Boundary Problem Resolved

Agreement has been reached between Torrance and Redondo Beach on the relocation of the boundary line between the two cities. Only the legal procedures must be carried out now to put the agreement into effect. This will take about 60 days, according to Francis Hopkins, acting city manager of Redondo Beach.

The new boundary line, which will be an "either-or" rather than a "half and half" boundary, will follow Elena ave., then zig-zag across several lots rather than slicing them in half as they now are, leaving them either in Torrance or in Redondo Beach.

The new boundary proposition was introduced at the Redondo Beach Council meeting Monday and later approved by the city boundary commission. In Torrance, a hearing on the boundary relocation will be held on Wednesday evening, June 3, at 8 p.m. at City Hall.

The new boundary will go into effect 30 days after legal requirements have been fulfilled, Hopkins said. These legal requirements include hearings, plus the posting and publishing of intention to annex, he explained.

Among the celebrated individuals present were Roberta Lynn, mistress of ceremonies, Myron Floren, and Paul Norback, noted Finnish accordionist.
