Dr. Kline himself designed part of the equipment used in this survey which was carried out under the auspices of the Los Angeles College of Optometry.

"Our equipment could not be more modern than it is—we have two precision machines in our grinding laboratory which are the latest you could possibly get," Dr. Kline commented.

While Dr. J. M. Soss and Dr. C. E. Kline, optometrists, are also associated with this new office, Dr. A. F. Kline will be permanently present and in charge of this Torrance branch.

The office is attractively furnished and has two examining rooms, two fitting booths, one visual training room and its own lens grinding laboratory. recommendations of the Industries Tax Committee.

The letter, signed by Chairman R. I. Plomert, Jr., called for the following three steps:

"(1) Fullest possible use throughout the year of available school playground facilities where their use will not interfere with school classes, especially during vacation periods when there are no classes.

"(2) If this full operation of these facilities requires additional personnel, then the city general budget should provide for this requirement; and

"(3) We feel that no additional recreational tax levy should be made at this time but any capital outlay projects for recreational facilities which are needed be submitted to the people for a vote on these projects."

The letter was filed as a matter of record.

Councilman Nick Drale made a motion, seconded by Councilman Victor Benstead, that the recreation department's recent recommendation for a 10 cent tax be denied. The motion was defeated on a three-two vote on the basis that the matter was intended for the budget meeting.

Under the chairmanship of Herald Rapstad, the junior chamber is distributing scotch light to the schools. Faculty advisors will distribute them to the kids in turn.

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
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
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
