Arguments in Favor Among arguments in favor of a residential zone brought by a number of individuals and organizations were the following: near-by land to the 55-acre tract is all residential; the trend is to settle heavy industry in the north of Torrance (north of Carson); Torrance needs many more homes; a greater population offers a greater labor market for near-by industries and a more agreeable transportation set-up than one where workers must travel long distances; the discrepancy between industrial and residential tax returns is not too great; pay-roll dollars will be spent here; the approval of the tract by the Federal Housing Association has been obtained; an approval based on a long-range value of a project and difficult to get.

Local Banks To Disappear — Saturdays!

Spokesmen for the Bank of America and the Torrance National Bank have indicated that the banks will be closed as of July 11, though no official confirmation of this date has been announced as yet.

The two local banks will join with the rest of the banks in California in observing a five-day work week as a result of a new bill passed this session by the California legislature and signed last week by Gov. Earl Warren.

Spokesmen for both banks said that it was likely that it will be agreed upon to stay open one evening a week, "preferably Friday." How many hours in the evening this would be was not announced.

Banks may remain open under the provisions but certain banking procedures would not be permitted.

The plan originally called for the erection of three presses, one of 35,000 ton capacity, a 25,000 ton press, and another of 20,000 ton capacity.

Special Plant The presses were to have been erected in a huge building which was to have been constructed directly south of the present plant on the east side of Western Ave.

Harvey stated that the Air Force announcement did not concern plans of the company for additional construction planned to be located on the west side of Western ave. at 190th st., and which is to be erected with private capital. He stated, however, that those construction plans were still very definite.

In announcing the cutback Thursday, Air Force Secy. Harold E. Talbot, emphasized that the decision does not reflect a change in the Air Force's estimate of the value of the presses. Rather, he said, the decision stemmed from "a belief that the number of presses is in excess of requirements."

School Gets Telezonia . . .

Torrance Unified School District was offered without cost and accepted a kit from the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company which they call a Telezonia Kit. This is a package of study aids especially prepared to teach children the proper use of the telephone. It contains a 16 mm color film, two telephones, two directories, a 35 mm film strip, booklets for the children to use and a teacher's manual.

The kit was accepted and placed in the district library for the use of teachers upon request.

The net assessed property valuations for the year have been estimated at \$66,000,000, slightly less than 10% above that of last year.




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
