## ARMORY GRANTED 1 YEAR

A time-extension of one year for the construction of the Torrance armory was granted the National Guard at the last meeting of the City Council.

The request was made because the National Guard must still obtain federal funds for the armory now that it has received the State allotment.

Congress has appropriated \$13,000,000 for armories. State and government officials this week will discuss the allocation of these federal funds at a meeting in Sacramento.

Construction of the armory is to start this fall if the federal allotment materials.

National Guard and Regular Army high ranking officials have been charged with coordinating the joint Federal-State project.

This paper has campaigned for such an armory for three years and was recently informed by Representative Vincent Thomas, who had been working actively on behalf of the armory, that a State allotment had been passed before the close of the legislative session.

The construction will be a \$167,000 job.



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

