inefficiency, mismanagement, partiality in making promotions, handling of the registry, failure to adjust routes, and use of government workers on private tasks during working hours, and slow distribution of mail.
"Enclosed is a clipping of the story as it appeared in this paper.
"We hope that the Torrance appeal will meet with greater success than the recent Palos Verdes appeal which was skillfully evaded.
"We also hope that you will provide an inspector from the outside, rather than the resident inspector, to handle the case.
"We know, Mr. Senator, that you are the final authority in this matter and we would be grateful for your consideration, aid and support."

Reaction
The reaction to the post office story in some quarters was one of satisfaction that a long-brewing, troublesome situation had been finally brought to the attention of the public rather than being kept confined within the postal department.

Agreement was voiced concerning the truth of the proposed charges.

Post Office Officials
Post office officials, on the other hand, were completely in the dark concerning charges or an investigation.

Mrs. Clara A. Conner, Torrance postmaster, said that the article appearing in this paper and the supposed investigation were "all news" to her. "I knew nothing about it and was quite flabbergasted at what I read. We have nothing to cover up and there is nothing crooked going on."

George Hannan, superintendent of mails, declared that "every effort is being made to give the best service to everyone commensurate with the (U.S.) administration's policy that for every dollar's pay there should be a dollar's service."

Hannan, too, stated that talk of an investigation was news to him. When asked if he had been aware of any unusual amount of dissatisfaction among post office employees he said no, adding that there is bound to be a little dissatisfaction in any organization. What dissatisfaction he knew of in the post office, he said, was no more than what was normal. The superintendent of mails stated that the reason that all routes are maintained at maximum lengths is to get the most out of the tax dollar and to work within the limited post office budget.

Assistant Postmaster Deiningner simply said: "All I know is what I read in the papers. I have nothing to say on it and not the least idea what the deal is."

property. The motion was seconded by Councilman Nick Drale and unanimously adopted by the Council.

\$500,000 Fund
Tying in with Tuesday night's action is a recent motion made by Councilman Benstead to consider placing a proposition on next April's ballot for permission to use the half-million dollars left over from a water-bond issue for the purpose of purchasing a swimming pool, a new civic center site, and a new fire station.

Benstead, in commenting on this matter again, said that he wanted the people to know sufficiently in advance what is being proposed and will see to it that plans are drawn up to show what the new development looks like.

Up to Voters
When asked if it were permissible to use the half-million dollar fund for these various purposes by putting the matter to the voters, City Manager Stevens said that this was in fact the only way such money could be allocated for anything else than it was originally intended for.

The money was left over from the two million dollar water bond issue because of some favorable contracts which the department was able to obtain.
