In order to cope with the increasing transportation requirements, future needs will dictate either an underground or above-ground transportation system, according to Mrs. Harry B. Rawlings, program chairman.

Of the two possibilities, monorail is said to be more advantageous in many respects. Monorail only costs two million dollars a mile while tunneling costs eighteen million dollars. Monorail is capable of carrying 90 people per car.


George D. Rovers, of the Monorail Engineering and Construction Corporation, will speak and show pictures at the affair.
