tion Board coordinator, in his letter to the Recreation and Park Commission included guarantees that Bixby Slough's lake would be maintained at a constant level with fresh water and that a storm drain would be constructed across Anaheim Boulevard at the lake's outlet.

According to George Hjelte, the project's coordinator, the County of Los Angeles is contributing \$50,000 and the Los Angeles City Council has appropriated \$100,000 for 155 acres of Bixby Slough land. The total area comprises 422 acres, and 232 acres are already in public ownership, Hjelte stated.

Los Angeles' Bureau of Right-of-Way and Land is now negotiating for the property remaining in private ownership, he said.

POOL

Following final checking of plans, bids will be called for construction of an indoor and an outdoor pool to be erected adjacent to Harbor Junior College. The pools will be jointly financed by the Recreation and Park Department and the Board of Education. They will be used for school swimming classes during the fall, winter, and spring, and for the Recreation and Park Department's aquatics program during the summer.

Hjelte reported that sponsors of the Bixby Slough project envision the areas' development into a recreation center complete with boating and other aquatic facilities and a wildlife refuge.
