

New City Maps

The Torrance Chamber of Commerce will have new maps of the city of Torrance available around December 1. The new maps will be twice as large as the present ones and will contain such additional information as street numbers and bus routes.

GRANT WATER RIGHTS

With a few last somber warnings coming from those opposing the granting of water rights to the Dominguez water company, three council members voted in favor of granting the company the right to service the Milton Kaufman tract for ten years from the time the contract is signed.

Councilman Nick Drale's motion to that effect was seconded by Councilman Victor Benstead. Mayor Mervin M. Schwab was the third member to vote in favor.

The area involved is the 362 acres at the corner of 190th and Hawthorne where a 2400 home development is being planned. "Yeah, wanna make a swan son," Councilman Willys Blount began in speaking against the measure. He was joined in the negative vote by Councilman Harvey Spelman.

Mayor Mervin Schwab summarized the stand taken by those voting affirmatively when he stated that the city has very little to lose in the matter the first ten years, that it has its hands full anyway in supplying water to the whole area, and that he doubt if one, much less 2400 will be built in the next year.

The Torrance Unified School District and the Recreation Department have cooperated this year on a plan whereby all games will be played in the fine new boys' gymnasium. A pre-season round of play is to follow the men's volleyball leagues, which draws to a conclusion on November 18.

Regular league play will be scheduled to begin January 5, immediately following the Christmas holidays. All basketball players who are not on a team but desire to play are invited to attend, Moon said, and that he would assist them to get on a team is possible.

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


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
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
