Drive Tops Community Chest Mark

The 1953 Community Chest campaign has smashed the \$8,000,000 mark in its solicitations. This year's campaign has produced more funds than in any previous year, Maynard J. Toll, campaign chairman, reported this week.

Standings in the Harbor Area show that Torrance still leads the parade of cities with 112% followed by: Harbor City, 105%; Palos Verdes, 100%; Gardena, 99%; Rolling Hills, 95%; Lomita, 93%; Wilmington, 93% and San Pedro with 84%.

"Although this has been a record-breaking year," Toll said, "there are still some assignments that are outstanding—those that need call backs—and I am quite confident that if these are attended to, we will shatter all previous records by a wide margin."

The Community Chest office in the Harbor Area is still a din of activity, as the Chest workers prepare to "clean-up" the campaign before the holidays.

Funds Still Lacking
Shooting for an \$82,057 goal for this year's campaign, report figures from Area Chairman William C. Bullock show that the Harbor Area still lacks 5% or \$4000 of the select 100% circle.

In making this report before his top leadership, Bullock asked that his volunteers in the Harbor Area—3000 strong—stay on the job as long as possible.

"This 5% is what separates us from finishing up what we started to do last November. This 5% is what separates us from having a successful campaign in the Harbor Area. We must raise this money, for we are all aware of what will happen if we fall in this task of raising money for the 164 health and welfare services in the Chest. If we would all get out and clean-up any unfinished assignments I am sure you will realize this 5%," he said.

The Area office will stay open today and tomorrow, Friday, to accept any late contributions.
