

COP GETS BRUTAL BEATING BY BROTHER-SISTER TEAM

Attacked Guarding New Homes

Officer Miles Hamilton of the Torrance police force was viciously beaten around the head Saturday night by Louis Beckel, 29, who allegedly was skeptical of Hamilton's claim that he was a police officer guarding the Ellinwood tract on Highway 101 near the Fish Shanty.

At one time during the fray, Beckel's sister, Mrs. Lydia Alvarado, allegedly lifted a slab of concrete and yelled, "Let him up, Louis, I'll kill the f---er."

Held

Held for their preliminary hearing, January 8, on charges of assault and battery are Louis Beckel, 29, of 21011 Shearer, and his sister, Mrs. Lydia E. Alvarado, 42, of the same address. Each is being held in place of \$1500 bail. A third occupant of the car in which they were riding was not held, since the individual refused to have anything to do with the fight when Mrs. Alvarado tried to persuade him to intervene, according to Det. Capt. Ernie Ashton.

Got Lost

Beckel who worked as a plasterer in the tract until he was laid off two weeks ago, claimed that he was looking for Portuguese Bend and had gotten lost when Hamilton stopped his car as it came driving into the tract. Hamilton, who was working as a guard in the tract during his off-duty hours, told Beckel and his passengers that they were on private property and that they must leave. Some strong language passed between both men as they asked each other for identification. When Beckel snatched Hamilton's identification card away from him, a tussle followed during which Lydia Alvarado, Beckel's sister, got hit in the shoulder, according to Captain Ashton.

Vicious Beating

Beckel, who has a massive build and a powerful pair of hands, thereupon clipped Hamilton on the side of his ear, jumped on him, and let loose with a series of facial blows which left sizeable horn-like swellings on the officer's forehead, and purple, inflamed areas all over his face.

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


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SABRE TRAINER Newest jet trainer is this North American TF-86, two place version of the Korea-famed Air Force F-86 Sabre Jet. The swift prototype trainer is basically an F-86F with tandem cockpit, dual controls and a fuselage five feet longer than the fighter version. It has a speed of over 650 miles an hour, a maximum service ceiling of 45,000 feet and a combat radius of 600 miles. Provision has been made for installation of two .50 caliber machine guns for gunnery practice. It also has the famed North American "all flying tail" with artificial feel and irreversible control systems.

No. American Yo-Yo Tests New Trainer Jet

A two-seat trainer version of the Korea-famed Air Force F-86 Sabre jet capable of exceeding the speed of sound in a dive is undergoing flight evaluation by North American Aviation's engineering flight test section after a successful first flight, it was announced today.

The swift prototype is the nation's first trans-sonic trainer, and is designed for advanced pilot training in high speed flight, gunnery, and dive bombing.

Additions
In building the trainer, North American engineers added a tandem cockpit, dual controls and a duplicate instrument panel to the original installations of the Air Force F-86F fighter-bomber.

Only two modifications to the F-86F airframe were necessary to compensate for the additions. The fuselage section between the nose and wing roots was extended 63 inches and the 35 degree swept back wings were moved forward eight inches.

Airframe
A proven airframe was used for conversion to a high speed trainer to reduce costs of development and production and to provide a ready store of spare parts and trained maintenance personnel.

North American Aviation's choice of the F-86F reduced development costs.

GANG ATTACKS TORRANCE YOUTH

A 19-year-old Torrance youth was severely beaten in San Pedro shortly after midnight Sunday when a gang of four attacked him as he stopped his car preparatory to escorting his girl friend to the front door.

Three youths have been booked on charges of assault with a deadly weapon.

Police were told that as the victim Joseph Olloque, 19, of 2251 West 203rd street, stopped his car in front of the girl's home near Twenty-fourth and Alma streets, San Pedro, another automobile bearing four persons stopped in the street on the driver's side, and one of the four jumped out and ordered Olloque out of his car.

Swinging Starts
Olloque said the fellow opened the door, pulled him out of the car and started swinging at him, and was joined by the other three, all of whom beat him, kicked him and knocked him to the ground.

Olloque's girl friend attempted to assist him, and she was knocked to the ground, whereupon the four hoodlums leaped into their car and sped away.

Olloque and the girl went to the San Pedro receiving hospital for treatment of cuts and abrasions and reported the incident to police.

Flying Saucers Linked With Religious Cult

Some flying saucer stories are not to be sneezed at, but some are strictly for the birds.

One of the individuals who has been greatly responsible for spreading flying saucer stories is George Adamski of Palomar (not associated with Mt. Palomar Observatory).

I decided to go to Mt. Palomar for a personal interview with Adamski who is the author of "The Flying Saucers Have Landed" and the focal point of a large group of saucer-enthusiasts.

Heads Cult
Following the two-hour interview with Adamski and one of his followers, I felt convinced that Adamski was simply the head of a religious cult. He seemed to be a man obsessed with visions of a "better life" for an "imperfect" world who capitalized on the popularity of flying saucers to spread his particular ideas.

The following circumstances and impressions led me to that conclusion.

There were three others in my party when I went to the Palomar Gardens Cafe where Adamski lives, just 11 miles from the world-famous Mount Palomar Observatory.

Others, too, had made a special pilgrimage to the attractive, rustic-looking cafe to

hear Adamski. We found him speaking to one of these groups in a booming voice as we entered.

Sincere
Whatever else is questionable about George Adamski, it must be said that he sounds sincere about his convictions. All else is open to controversy.

Vague
I observed what had been brought to my attention by an acquaintance who had also visited Adamski. Whenever Adamski spoke of his impressions of a flying saucer (he claims to have ridden in one for a distance of 50,000 miles) his descriptions were vague, brief, and uncomfortably evasive.

But a person who has had such overpowering experiences and stood in the presence of such extraordinary beings from another world would be compelled to talk about his experiences in every minute detail for the rest of his life.

Ideal Society
In his book as well as in his conversation Adamski emphasizes the ideal qualities of the spacemen (or, Saucerians) and life on other planets. The Saucerians, says Adamski, live to be 1000 years old. They work only two hours a day. There are no diseases or illnesses among them. The society is a classless so-

ciety, eliminating the type of social snobbery practiced in one form or other among us. Saucerians spend most of their time studying or traveling. There are just as many women holding responsible jobs as men and a large part of the flying saucer crew is made up of women. The crew is not divided according to rank, but everybody counts the same and can do everybody else's work.

These thoughts follow the same basic pattern of all reformers who have tried to draw a picture of what the ideal society—Utopia—would be like.

George Adamski
George Adamski is a curious and fascinating person. He is 62 years old but looks like a handsome, athletic man of about 50. There is a magnetic attraction in his eyes which frequently seems to hold his listeners spellbound. He talks in a loud, rapid, affirmative manner often jumping from thought to thought. He has lived at the restaurant for the last nine years, since it was started. The restaurant is owned by two women. A third, who lives there, is said to be Adamski's wife. Mrs. Adamski was "indisposed" when we were there Saturday. Consequently we were not able to meet her.

Adamski is a self-schooled man. He dictates his ideas to one of the three women

who acts as his secretary. His book was written in this manner.

Devoted Follower
I had a chance to talk to one of Adamski's followers. She was a teacher. She visited the cafe over the week-end every few weeks to be near Adamski.

"I have been a follower of his for 22 years," said the elderly woman. "He is a wonderful being... a free soul... and he has so much to give the world. He headed the University of Religious Science in Pasadena and Laguna Beach... we were not connected with any other religious group. There were about 50 of us.

"When I first came to one of his meetings I needed help. I didn't have anything to hold on to and I was looking for answers. And there he was and he gave me the answers I was looking for, and they were the same words which my father had used. My father was a philosopher, too.

"I have seen him (Adamski) help so many people. Sometimes he doesn't even speak to them directly but when they hear him speak they go away with the answers which they were looking for.

"He has written so many things. Most (Continued on Page 11)
