## FLAMES TURN GIRL INTO HUMAN TORCH

Aroused by screams for help, a 19-year-old Torrance polio cripple dragged himself frantically through four rooms on his hands and knees to save his 5-year-old sister who had been engulfed in flames when her nightgown caught fire while she stood near an electric floor heater.

Hero of the tragedy is Reginald Griffin, who has been paralyzed from the waist down since he was 18 months old. Griffin has been working for Northrup for the last four months.

Near death in Harbor General Hospital with third degree burns over 60 per cent of her body is his sister, Diana Griffin.

The tragedy took place at 6:45 a.m. in their home at 193rd st. and Western ave.

Tuesday, in Harbor General Hospital, is still in critical condition, Reginald, who beat out the flames, suffered first and second degree burns. He is being comforted by his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Griffin.

## 3 PLANTS RUMORED TO LOCATE HERE

Land, zoned heavy manufacturing (M-2) and located at Madrona north of Torrance boulevard, is being graded and landscaped by Chanslor Canfield Midway Oil company, owners of the property, for the benefit of interested parties, it was revealed this week.

A representative from industry is said to have looked at the property already. The area involved, which covers about 70-80 acres, is located north of Maricopa as far as the city dump and the Dominguez reservoir and extending from Maple avenue to Madrona avenue. Grading cost is said to approximate \$70,000.

The area is just north of the proposed new civic center site. The area located across from the present area being graded was similarly landscaped some time ago but nothing further was done with it.
