(Continued from Page 1) 41 people during this period. A total of 1668 individuals were bitten by dogs within the last 10 years.

Cost The present method of rabies prevention costs on the average of \$2.50 for every person who has been bitten by a dog. There were 379 persons who were bitten in Torrance in 1953. Care of these cases cost a total of \$947.50.

This money pays for medical investigators to follow up persons bitten by rabid and suspected rabid animals; mileage; physician's home calls and clinic services; anti-rabies vaccine; laboratory services; nursing services; and general operative expenses. This does not include the cost of private medical care, veterinary care, or the Department of Animal Regulation expenditures, according to the Department of Health.

Such costs would be eliminated through instituting a compulsory anti-rabies vaccination program for dogs because it is not the policy to administer Pasteur treatments and other preventive measures in areas which are protected through a compulsory vaccination program.

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


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
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
