Council Clash

The city council only last week rekindled the controversy when it balked at the Planning Commission's recommendation to grant a variance to the hospital for the two-wing addition.

While the council did not reverse the recommendation at that time, it did table the matter till this coming Tuesday's meeting by a 3 to 2 vote. Those voting to hold the matter over were Councilmen Victor Benstead, Albert Isen and Mayor Nick Drae.

A previous motion by Councilman Willys G. Blount to concur with the planning commission's recommendation only received the support of Councilman Mervin Schwab.

Objections

Objections to the hospital plan came from the Nativity Church and petitions signed by more than 1000 residents. In a letter to the hospital board this week Father McGuinness argued that the proposed wings would permit only 38 beds while the former First Christian Church building which he has to offer will permit 150 beds. It is much better suited to future expansion needs, he stated.

The present proposal, the minister argued, violates all setback violations.

If the church kept its new addition and the hospital built its two wings, the parking situation in that area would be gravely aggravated, the minister stated.

AIRPORT . . .

Expansion of the industrial area at Torrance municipal airport has been approved by the Civil Aeronautics Administration. This will make a total of about 25 acres of land available which would satisfy the requests of three interested industries.

SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION . . .

Contract on the Hillside School, south of Crenshaw and east of Highway 101, was awarded to the Brewer Webb Construction company for \$203,400. A total of 12 rooms and an administration building are planned. A six-months completion date has been set.
