

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3rd Robbery Suspect Captured

Paul Robert Frank, 32, captured after a year's search, will face charges of participating in a spectacular \$30,000 Torrance robbery April 2, 1953. He will appear for his preliminary hearing tomorrow, Friday, at 9:30 a.m.

Detective Capt. Ernie Ashton, who brought Frank back from Portland, Ore., said that the suspect had signed a full confession.

Frank is the last of a trio charged with robbery of Joe Alden, credit manager of the National Supply Employees' Credit Union. Alden was robbed while taking \$30,000 from the bank back to the credit union.

Frank was arraigned in South Bay municipal court last Friday on charges of robbery and grand theft. He was returned to Torrance last week from Portland, where he was captured.

Frank, and his girl friend, Miss Nilda Rodriguez formerly of Puerto Rico, led police on a prolonged chase, being reported in Florida, Puerto Rico, New York, and Oregon, before being caught. The two were on their way to Alaska.

The other two men involved in the burglary have already been apprehended. They are William McNally, 25, and Don Madlung, each doing from one to ten years for robbery and grand theft.

The date police have recorded \$14,800 of the money and a \$1600 automobile owned by Frank.

Another Torrance participant was Mrs. Alvin Cherin who acted as model for V. F. Eubank, capturing second place in the junior division.
