The Torrance Board of Education is entering its eighth year of operating schools for the citizens of Torrance. The district was formed August 20, 1946 when the voters of Torrance approved a new city charter and established an independent Board of Education.

California state legislature approved the city charter July 1, 1947, and on that date the Board of Education assumed jurisdiction of its elementary schools. A year later it assumed jurisdiction of the high school.

The enrollment of the district has increased over 500 per cent during that time, from 1995 children the first year to an estimated 11,000 children enrolled in the schools in September, 1954. This is only about 3000 less than the total population of Torrance seven years ago.

Teacher Increase
Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of schools, was the first employee of the Board of Education. Emmett W. Ingram, business manager, was the second employee of the Board of Education. The first year there

57 teachers employed. The district now has 361 teachers and nearly 600 employees.

The annual budget has grown from less than half a million, or around \$460,000, to \$3,600,000 during that time.

One of the unique features of the Torrance school district is the educational advisory committee which meets monthly at luncheon to discuss schools, and to develop two-way communication and understanding between the schools and the community.

Personal Schools
One of the objects of the Board has been to make the schools the people's personal schools. Among the most important phases of the school program is the technique which has been developed in Torrance for reporting to parents, particularly in the elementary schools with parent-teacher conferences resulting in a sound understanding between the home and the schools as to what is being done for the child.

The Board hopes that all new parents in the community and all new teachers in the community will avail themselves of the opportunity to develop this understanding between the home and the school through the parent-teacher conferences at reporting time in order to continue this understanding between the home and schools in the community.

Even though the district is only seven years old, it has established many sound methods and techniques for public education and is being observed by many other districts, school officials declared.

Many of the procedures are being used elsewhere that were originally established in Torrance.

High School Diplomas Available For Adults

"The value of a high school diploma cannot be over-estimated both for the obtaining of better employment opportunities and for the self-satisfaction of the adult who earns it," Dr. Vernon Sheblak, director of the Torrance School of Adult Education, stated this week.

The Torrance Board of Education is aware of the educational problems of adult as well as those of children. Upon the recommendation of Superintendent J. H. Hull, the Board has established the requirements for obtaining a high school diploma.

Adults may now earn a diploma by attendance at evening classes at Torrance Evening High School. Credit is given for work experience and previous training as well as for school attendance.

Veterans who pass the Armed Forces Institute Test, which can be taken at the evening high school, are eligible for a diploma after completing only 10 semester periods of instruction.

Academic classes required for high school graduation to be offered this Fall semester include American government, English fundamentals, mathematics and United States history.

St. Catherine Labour School Begins Monday

"Normal bowel action is at least three full evacuations daily. Food waste should never be retained more than twenty-five to thirty-six hours at the longest, and the normal period is probably sixteen hours or less."

The expansive force of gases is too well known to need comment, and the force with which they will at times distend the abdominal wall points irresistibly to the conclusion that such an amount of force exerted against vital organs cannot be other than productive of serious harm.
