Harbor Goal

The total amount of \$20,720 represents Torrance's quota of the overall \$83,179 goal of the Harbor Area Community Chest, which was announced this week by Tommy Thompson, Area campaign chairman.

Chest quotas in Torrance, the Harbor Area and elsewhere, were set by the volunteers, themselves, in a series of meetings held throughout the past year to determine the campaign potential of communities in the Los Angeles area and the needs of the 164 Chest agencies.

The Harbor Area goal of \$83,179 is divided as follows: Residential, advance gifts and small business, \$32,161; Tommy Thompson, chairman. Commerce and industry, \$31,018; Nick O. Drake, chairman.

A breakdown of Torrance's quota shows that \$11,343 will be raised through residential, advance gifts and small business under the direction of Mrs. Ella Schwartz, chairman. The remaining \$9347 of the local
