In the meantime local developments in regard to the smog issue included a telegram from General Petroleum refusing to comply with Governor Goodwin J. Knight's request to join other refineries in a temporary shutdown.

The G.P. telegram from R. L. Mindler, president, was worded as follows:

"We share your concern about the smog problem, but your request that refineries be shut down is not sound, and if carried out, could do great damage to progress in solving the problem.

Shutting down the refineries can result in removing only about five per cent of the hydrocarbons not going into the air. There will still remain about ninety-five per cent of the

hydrocarbons along with the other pollutants.

"Atmospheric and meteorologic conditions determine whether we have smog or clear skies. If refineries are shut down, and we then have good or bad days, the public will come to the completely unjustified conclusion that refineries are entirely blameless or exclusively to blame so far as smog is concerned. Either conclusion could have had results on the program for smog control.

"General Petroleum Corporation is in one hundred per cent compliance with all orders and regulations of smog authorities. We wholeheartedly support research and other sensible programs for smog abatement, but we will not participate in your suggested program which at best would be meaningless."

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
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
