Willd Given Washington Appointment

Senator Thomas H. Kuchel of California today announced the appointment of John A. Willd, Jr., of Torrance as his new legislative assistant.

Willd succeeds Howard H. Schmidt, who resigned last month, after serving on the Senator's staff nearly two years, to resume the practice of law in California.

The new legislative assistant, who arrived in Washington Tuesday and will be joined by his wife and two children in a few weeks, has been engaged in private practice, also serving as deputy city prosecutor in Torrance.

Willd, who was born in Chicago in 1924, is the son of Dr. John A. Willd and Mrs. Kathleen Willd. He has lived in California since 1929, attending grammar and junior high schools in San Pedro before going to John Marshall High in Los Angeles and California Preparatory school. He attended UCLA for one semester before entering the Army in March 1943.

Attached to the 532nd Amphibious Engineers, he saw active service for 18 months in the Pacific Theater. Among the operations in which he was engaged were New Guinea, Leyte, Mindanao, and Korea.

Following his discharge in February 1946, Willd returned to UCLA, graduating with the

degree of Bachelor of Political Science in 1949. He received his law degree from the University of Southern California Law school in 1952 and entered the practice of law in Torrance.

Willd was married in 1949 to Beverly Tisdell of Santa Barbara. They have two children, Charles, age three, and Shirley, age seven months.

Willd, who was Republican candidate for the California Assembly last November, is a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon and Phi Alpha Delta (legal) the Torrance Lions Club, and the Junior Chamber of Commerce, of which he was a director.

Savings-Loan Firm Assets Rise 18%

An 18 per cent gain in total assets, was reported by Fred E. Edwards, president, Southwest Savings and Loan Association, in a statement released with the association's annual report.

Edwards said that the association's assets increased from \$19,192,035.11 on December 31, 1953, to \$22,685,528.91, on the same date this year. "This fine growth," Edwards commented, "reflects the confidence of the citizens of the Southwest portion of Los Angeles County in this specialized thrift and home ownership institution."

Highlights of the association's annual report were listed as follows:

1. Net savings in 1954 increased by \$3,930,983.04, or 26 per cent, bringing total savings to \$18,940,913.59.
2. The number of savings account holders increased to 8150, a gain of 1689, or 26 per cent, over last year.
3. Dividends paid out to savers totaled \$350,222.34.
4. Home loans made during 1954 increased both in number and amount, with such loans numbering 994, and totaling \$7,882,140.36. Total home loans outstanding now amount to \$20,357,136.65.
5. The association added \$421,273.22 to its reserve fund in the past year, increasing its reserves to \$1,543,537.07, or 8 per cent of savings.
