# Patients To Enter Handiwork

Approximately fifty individual entries in the forthcoming Hobby, Art & Flower show will be hobbies to be displayed by patients in Harbor General Hospital.

Inasmuch as crafts are a part of the occupational therapy program which is medically prescribed to aid recovery of the patients, such handiwork as needlework, copper enameling, jewelry, woodwork, leatherwork, and miscellaneous small items, especially jewelry fashioned with rhinestones and small semi-precious stones.

According to the advice of their physicians, patients are permitted to work a specified amount of time either in the ward or in the occupational therapy shop.

Emil Settlage is in charge of the occupational therapy department at Harbor General Hospital, and with his help, the patients also edit their own monthly paper called "Harborlite," which is exclusively for the patients. To further keep alive the patients' interest, they themselves participate in the functioning of the department.

The local Hobby, Art & Flower show on May 6, 7, and 8, will serve to further stimulate the interest these patients take in their respective hobbies.
