### Oil Sump Law Hearing Mon.

A public hearing on a proposed oil sump ordinance will be held before the Planning Commission Monday, May 9 at 7 p.m. in the council chamber of the city hall, Cravens corner El Prado.

Purpose of the proposed new law is to do away with the existing and potential hazards created by oil sumps, wells, and derricks in Torrance.

Drawn up by Deputy City Attorney Stanley Remelmeier, the measure calls for the following four provisions:

- (1) The removal of all wooden derricks on existing wells both producing and non-producing;
- (2) All future drilling of new wells, or deepening of wells, or other work on new or existing wells, be accomplished with the aid of portable metal drilling masts;
- (3) The removal of all existing sumps and prohibiting the digging or use of sumps in the future, excepting only sumps of a portable nature;
- (4) Requiring that all moving parts of wells be enclosed with a chain linked fence



### Ministerial Association To Aid Y

In an effort to help the Torrance YMCA out of the red, the Torrance Ministerial Association is planning a May 16 dinner meeting of church laymen for the purpose of organizing a fund-raising campaign.

A recent YMCA drive fell \$4200 short of its goal. Only \$7800 of the minimum \$12,000 needed for operating expenses were raised.

The downtown Los Angeles YMCA headquarters notified local Y leaders that it cannot subsidize the Torrance program any longer.

It has already spent \$10,000 here in the past.

Since Torrance is now a large community, the local Y ought to be able to support itself, Torrance officials were told.

The deficit for the current year ran about \$1800.

At the present time, some 800 youngsters participate in YMCA programs throughout the year, including Hi-Y, Tri-Hi-Y, and Gra-Y clubs; Indian Guide tribes, summer mountain camping trips, summer day camps, holiday fun clubs, athletic events, and various other activities.

In recent learn-to-swim activities held at the Hermosa Biltmore Hotel, 224 boys completed the program. Hi-Y and Tri-Hi-Y clubs in the area include some 360 members.

Income on the 1954-55 budget was some \$2500 less than anticipated, while expenditures were some \$1500 over expectations. The year's budget was \$15,509.
