Avoid Deep Planting Of Citrus Trees

Plant young citrus trees high to help avoid brown rot gummosis infestation, reports Bud Lee, University of California farm adviser of Los Angeles county.

Do not plant trees as deep as they come from the nursery. Plant the tree so that the first main lateral roots will be as near to the surface of the ground as possible.

Trees should also be planted high enough so that after setting the bud union will be fully as high or slightly higher from lateral roots should not be more than one inch below the surface of the soil.

As a further precaution against brown rot gummosis, a fungicide can be applied to the trunk of the tree. Pull back the soil covering the lower trunk or top of the first main lateral roots and apply a Bordeaux mixture in the form of a wash or thin paste. This treatment should be repeated in the fall before the first rains.

Lee states that these few simple precautions cost very little to protect the life and value of the young tree, the ground level than it was in the nursery.
