CHILDREN WARNED OF BLASTING CAPS

"Blasting caps are dangerous. Children should never touch them," Fire Chief J. J. Benner warned today in launching his annual campaign to protect boys and girls from injuries caused by blasting caps.

In experienced hands, he said, blasting caps serve a highly useful purpose. The farmer uses them to drain swamps, clear fields, and blast boulders out of the ground. Industry needs caps in important work of mining coal and metals, and in building roads, tunnels, and sky-scrappers.

But Chief Benner says only a skilled person knows how to handle the caps safely. When one explodes, hundreds of small pieces of metal fly out in all directions, sometimes as far as 200 feet. And even at that distance fragments can blind a child, tear off a hand, or, in extreme cases, cause death.

For that reason Chief Benner, who is carrying on this educational campaign in cooperation with the Institute of Makers of Explosives, urges "that anyone—child or adult—finding a blasting cap should leave it alone and call me or one of my deputies."

Appearance
Too few persons, he said, know what blasting caps look like. The chief described them as being copper or aluminum cylinders about as big around

as a lead pencil and from one-and-a-half to five inches long. The "ordinary cap" is exploded by sparks from a burning fuse inserted in one end. The other type, the electric cap, has two wires extending from one end which are connected by a thin wire that is sunk in the explosive charge in the cap. When electric current is applied, the thin wire becomes red hot and detonates the cap.

Chief Benner urges the users of explosives to keep caps under lock and key and to notify him when supplies are missing by theft or loss.

Customers will be assured of the lowest possible prices on canned goods, frozen foods, health and beauty aids, and light hardware, because of all purchasing being done through certified grocers, it was reported. Meat department supervisor is Irwin Kaser, in charge of offering quality cuts at prices no higher than those of ordinary meats.

Foods Co. market has planned

12 checkstands to assure customers of little or no waiting, a huge parking lot with space for more than 300 cars, magic eye doors that open automatically, asphalt tile floors, and scientifically planned lighting, stated Schwartz. Total of 125 persons will be on the opening staff of employees.
