Keystone To Get More Protection

Better police protection for the unincorporated county area including Keystone, was promised today by Sheriff E. W. Biscailuz when he announced the following changes in Sheriff's following districts.

Effective tomorrow, the unincorporated area designated below which is now policed by the Sheriff's Lennox Station, will be transferred to and become a part of the district policed by the Sheriff's Firestone Station:

1. That area bound on the north by 120th Street, on the east by Main Street, on the south by Lomita Blvd. and on the west by the City of Los Angeles boundaries along Normandie Avenue and Figueroa Street.
2. That area bound on the north by 190 Street, on the east by a line approximately midway between Normandie Avenue and Rosemead Street, on the south by approximately 203 Street and on the west by Normandie Avenue.
3. That area bound on the north by approximately

170 Street, and on the east by Vermont Avenue, on the south by 182 Street and on the west by Denker Avenue.

4. That area bound on the north by 166 Street, on the east by Gramercy Place and Western Avenue, on the south by 182 Street and on the West by a line just west of Western Avenue and Illinois Street.

The above areas are in census tracts 528, 335 A and 340 C. The new boundaries between the Firestone and Lennox Station will thus coincide with the east boundary line of the Los Angeles City shoe-string strip between 120 Street and Lomita Blvd., except for the islands of census tract 335 A south of 190 Street and census tract 340 C north of 182 Street.

Sheriff Biscailuz emphasizes the changes are being effected to increase the services to the residents of the listed areas and are the results of increased budget and personnel allowances recently voted by the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors.

Thief Gets \$50 From Feed Store

Overlooking an additional \$200 stashed away in the same drawer, a nocturnal burglar made off with \$50 in cash Monday from the H and H Feed store, 2903 Arlington avenue, according to the Torrance police records.

The thief entered by breaking a rear window. Det. Capt. Ernest Ashton, investigating officer, stated that footprints of a size 6 1/2 or 7 tennis shoe found around the rear of the building indicate that the heist was made by a juvenile.

The owners of the store, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Hutslar, who live in a building at the rear of the store reported that they heard no noise during the night, and discovered the burglary when they opened the store on Tuesday morning.

LET'S HAVE A SAFE HOLIDAY CHIEF URGES

Police Chief Willard O. Haslam issued an urgent plea to all residents of the area to make this July 4th week-end holiday as safe and accident-free as last year. Over last year's Independence Day week-end there were only five accidents, all of them auto, with only two resulting in personal injury.

The Chief pointed out that there were no accidents involving firecrackers or other pyrotechnics. He expressed the hope that the same care and caution would be shown this year. "There is no need for anyone, adult or child, to be maimed by fireworks. Just be careful," he said.

Radiation Study

The U. S. Atomic Energy Commission has awarded a financial grant to the City of Hope for a three-year study of the effects of radiation on living organisms. Approximately \$8,500 is involved for each year of the research program.

Workers Set for Midnight Walkout

A nation-wide steel strike which would idle 814 men at the Columbia Steel plant here seemed a certainty today when officials of Columbia's parent organization, United States Steel, and union leaders announced that no further progress has been made in contract negotiations.

Strike deadline is set for midnight tonight, and little likelihood exists that an agreement will be reached today that will forestall the walkout, it was reported. The union has rejected the company offer of an average pay increase of 10c per hour. Contract negotiation at this time are limited to wage discussions only. No fringe benefits

are involved in the dispute, the company disclosed.

M. E. Spicer, representative of Columbia, declared that the union has rejected the company offer, but has offered no counter demand.

Alex McJannett, president of the local steel workers union, is in Pittsburgh now as a member of the union negotiating team.

First Federal Announces Dividends

Today, more than 5200 investors residing in Torrance, Lomita and San Pedro area will receive in excess of \$160,000 in dividends from the First Federal Savings and Loan Association of San Pedro, according to George G. Collins.

This sum represents earnings on savings for the first six months of 1955, being paid at the rate of 3 1/4% per annum. Collins said.

In releasing the figure, Collins stated that total assets of the institution had climbed to well over \$12,500,000 during the period, attaining a new high in resources.

The association maintains a fully staffed office in Lomita at 2233 Lomita Blvd., for the convenience of Lomita, Harbor City and Torrance savers.


