Torrance Gets \$197,425 From Vehicle Taxes

George Stevens, city manager, this week announced that the City of Torrance has received \$197,425.39 of motor vehicle license fee, "in lieu" tax from the state of California, covering a period from December 1, 1954, through May 31, 1955.

The tax, levied at the rate of \$2 per \$100 market value on each vehicle, is distributed to the cities on a population basis. The state is using the last official census figure of 44,914 in apportioning the Torrance money. A more up-to-date census figure would net Torrance a higher return in the tax.

Woman Dies in Collision

A young Torrance mother was dead Sunday and her husband and three-year-old son were in the hospital in critical condition following a head on collision on the wet pavement of Main st., near 208th st.

Child Critical

Mrs. Jo Ann Gagliano, 32, of 313 Clarion Dr., was dead on arrival at Harbor General Hospital. Her husband Vincent, 30, is in fair condition, according to a report from the hospital yesterday. He suffered a fractured left jaw and multiple lacerations of the head and body. The child, Steven, 3, remains in critical condition, but has shown improvement, the hospital disclosed.

Son Dies

Also dead in the accident was a Los Angeles woman, Mrs. Violetta Flores, 33, and her son Juan, 5. Her husband, Leonard Flores, 32, sustained major injuries and is still at Harbor Hospital.

California Highway Patrolman Al R. Kreipl said cars driven by Flores and Gagliano collided after Flores apparently lost control of his vehicle.

A light drizzle, which left the pavement slick as glass, was blamed for the mishap.

DUMP SITE

Homeowners Ask Nuisance Guarantees

Seeking assurances that residents of the Rolling Hills area will be protected from possible nuisances if a regional dump is located at the site of the old dicalite mine, officials of the Palos Verdes Properties Corp., this week petitioned the county sanitation district for guarantees.

Ivar Hanson, general manager for the firm, disclosed that he has presented a list of requirements to county officials

who have started proceeding to acquire the 160-acre mine site for a refuse disposal area.

Guarantees against heavy traffic, smoke, dust, odors, animal pests, insects and unsightly grounds are being sought.

Six county sanitation districts which serve over a million persons will petition Los Angeles Superior Court soon to have the property condemned for use as a dump. Hanson stated that he is hopeful that the requirements sought by his firm will become part of any adjudication.

The property in question is located north of Palos Verdes Dr., North and west of Crenshaw blvd.

ECC Opens Summer Registration

Students wishing to enroll for the summer session of El Camino college will register in the Campus center June 30 from 1 p.m. until 9 p.m.

"The last day to register will be July 6, providing that classes are available," Merl F. Sloan, director of student personnel, cautioned prospective latecomers. Seventy-five classes will be offered, Sloan added, most of them scheduled from 6 to 10 p.m., nightly.

The summer session will run from the opening day classes, July 1, to August 12. An enrollment of 1600 is anticipated by college officials. Members of the regular college staff will of-

fer instruction, and all facilities of the college will be available.

"The summer school program provides students the opportunity to accelerate their college work and gives workers the advantage of obtaining a few units credit while still working part or full time," Sloan indicated. "Advantage," the director cited, "is directed to high school graduates who wish to make up subject deficiencies prior to starting their college careers."

Present New Oil Ordinance

Representative of Torrance oil producers Tuesday night submitted proposed amendments to the existing oil drilling ordinances at the meeting of the City Council.

The model ordinance prepared for the drillers by Atty. Donald Hitchcock provides that all wooden derricks will be removed; that all pumps in operation will be adequately guarded with fences and that only portable oil sumps will be used in the future. It also calls for drainage of existing sumps.

The proposed law was referred for study by the council and will be discussed again at the meeting of July 5.

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
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
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
