

A wide variety of special events has been planned for the summer of 1955, the summer brochure just issued by the Torrance Recreation Department reveals.

Among the outstanding special events noted were: A series of 5 teenage dances in the civic auditorium; a water safety show conducted by the Los Angeles County Lifeguards; a local and city-wide pet show; an all games day, talent show, 3 teenage plays, including a western musical; mother and daughter tea; fish derby at Alondra Park; city-wide circus at Torrance Park; old-fashioned picnic at Torrance Park; family dance; baby show; concerts at the Torrance Park band shell every Sunday; and the annual open house program in the civic auditorium.

A summer brochure recently released by the department of recreation is now available for public distribution, according to Tony Gallo, special events supervisor.

Four thousand programs will be distributed through the schools before June 17. Anyone interested in picking up the program may do so by calling at the recreation department office, on El Prado near Cravens.

All games will be played Wednesday afternoons at Torrance park, Walteria park, El Retiro park, and McMaster park.

A father and son banquet will be held at the end of the season. Trophies will be given out to the winning team.
