ANTHONY'S ADVENTURES

I got a letter the other day. From Mrs. Pat Sandridge on Yukon avenue. So the column today is a letter in answer. But I think it's going to be something you'd all like to read . . . so eavesdrop a little.

Dear Mrs. Sandridge: Our lasagna recipe hasn't been in the column up to this time, but in answer to your request and many others here it is.

Anthony's Baked Lasagna

Sauce:
1 quart Anthony's Spaghetti Sauce (or your own homemade sauce)

Meat:
1 pound chopped beef
½ pound chopped pork
Mix beef and pork.
Fried in Olive Oil.

Cheese:
2 pounds Ricotta cheese seasoned with several sprigs of chopped parsley, salt, pepper, grated cheese and one egg. Mix thoroughly.

½ pound grated Italian cheese (Parmesan or Romano)
½ pound thin sliced Mozzarella cheese

Lasagne:
1 pound wide Lasagne noodles. Boil 6 quarts water with 3 table-spoons salt.

Place Lasagne in boiling water one at a time. Boil for 15 minutes and rinse in cold water and drain.

Place a thin layer of sauce in bottom of baking dish, then a layer of Lasagne to cover bottom. Spread a layer of Ricotta about ½ inch thick on top of Lasagne. Sprinkle a layer of meat next, then a layer of sauce and sprinkle with grated cheese. Start again and repeat for several layers, ending with Lasagne. Top this with a layer of sliced Mozzarella cheese and a final layer of sauce. Bake in 250 degree oven for 20 minutes. Serves 10 large dinner portions.

Big secret: We think a Lasagne is better if baked the day before you plan to serve it. Just add a little sauce and re-heat.

Well, there you are, Mrs. Sandridge. Please let us know how it turns out. We'd really like to hear from any of our friends who try this recipe. Gee, I'm out of space . . . Bye-bye.
