## Swimming Pool Comes In Handy Kit

Backyard swimming pool big enough for the entire family but simple enough to be assembled in a few minutes and reasonable in cost is being introduced. Sizes range from 10 feet in diameter to five feet and one foot deep to two and a half.

Pool consists of Masonite Duolux panels, overlapped and fastened together in a circle with bolts and wing nuts, and a liner tank of vinyl plastic. The masonite is colorfully decorated to simulate an ivy-covered yellow brick wall, and the plastic is a bright green.

Pool may be set up on any level expanse of lawn. It is filled with a garden hose and emptied through a hose connecting drain. When the outdoor pool season is over, the unit may be dismantled and stored.
