These disposal systems will take care of at least half the sumps which are still standing in the Torrance oil fields, it was disclosed.

All old sumps which are no longer in use must be abandoned, drained, and covered, the proposed ordinance specifies further.

Fence

All moving parts are also to be shielded, guarded, and fenced using a six-foot chain linked fence.

The final draft is the outcome of proposals made both by the City Council and the oilmen. The matter will be discussed next Tuesday at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber of the City Hall, corner Cravens and El Prado.
