Councilman Victor Benstead sponsored the ordinance.

**TAXES:** The new tax rate was adopted. It dropped from last year's \$1.19 per \$100 of assessed valuation to \$1.184.

**PARKING:** Protest against parking restrictions on Torrance boulevard corner Crenshaw where areas have been painted red was made by Burt Lynn. Lynn claimed that the red zones work a hardship on small businesses in the area. Chief Willard Haslam informed the council that the zones were instituted as safety factors. The matter was referred to the Traffic Commission.


