### Suggest Method For Refinishing Brick Surfaces

Reader writes that he has a brick house, the brick rough and cracked, and asks for suggestion of materials other than stucco to cover the exterior.

Only other material for such purpose is asbestos shingle or wood siding which is applied over furring strips fastened to brick wall. It might also be a consideration to paint brickwork either with a rubber base masonry paint or, if brick has never been painted, with a cement base paint that comes in powder form and is mixed with water.

It's also possible that present walls are not beyond refinishing. It might be well to consult a good mason and learn his recommendation in such a case.

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
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
