Plastics Building
 In the sub-assembly area, the plastics groups occupy 43,000 square feet and this space is needed for center wing and fuselage installation work on the AD-6 Skyraider. A separate plastics building is being built to alleviate this situation. It is the largest structure under present plans and it will accommodate the department's increasing activities.
 The tooling division now occupies 28,000 square feet of assembly area. This space is needed for the assembly of the F4D, so the tooling building will be extended.

An enlarged maintenance building is necessary to relieve the crowded conditions of the electrical and mechanical maintenance groups.
 The carpenter shop will be relocated to permit a portion of the addition to be used for steel and sheet metal fabrication, machinery repair and overhaul.

New Storage Shelter
 The need for a maintenance storage shelter, to store shop and materials handling equipment used in plant operations, will be taken care of by addition of a new shelter.
 Due to the necessity of testing radomes under ideal conditions prior to their installation on airplanes, a new radome range area, composed of two small wooden structures, is under construction.

West of the Torrance facility, spur tracks have been laid for easy access to a new jigs and fixtures storage area.
 Two boilers to heat adequately the additional floor space are necessary so the boiler building is being enlarged.
 A paint booth building, for painting entire airplanes, is planned for the near future.

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Man Guilty Of Passing Bad Checks

The recent arrest of Mrs. Carol Ann McGlynn, 21, of 1126 Monterey, Hermosa Beach, on suspicion of passing forged checks in Torrance lead to the arrest of George Hopper, 32, of Los Angeles who pleaded guilty to passing bum checks.
 Charges against Mrs. McGlynn were dismissed on recommendation of the district attorney for statements which she made resulting in Hopper's arrest, according to Det. Capt. Ernie Ashton.
 Hopper will come up for sentencing September 16 in Department 41 of Los Angeles Superior Court.
 Mrs. McGlynn said that she met Hopper casually on the beach in Hermosa. Hopper passed bad checks totaling close to \$500, Ashton stated.
 Mrs. McGlynn was caught within a matter of 2 1/2 hours while passing a number of these checks in Torrance stores. Her arrest was attributed to the efficiency and cooperation of Torrance merchants, the Torrance Police Department, and the Chamber of Commerce.

 channel to 175th street along Glenburn.
 Supervisor Hahn has expedited the processing of the plant through flood control engineering offices so that work could begin before the rainy season.
 He said that the drain, when completed, would provide flood protection and drainage to a large section of North Torrance.

Work should begin by September 28. The project will require approximately seven months to complete.
 Supervisor Hahn pointed out that all bond issue storm drains are regional in character. Maximum efficiency of these drains can be attained by the local communities affected through construction of the necessary auxiliary laterals to the main drain.

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
