14,803 ENROLL IN TORRANCE SCHOOLS

A total of 14,803 students had enrolled in the Torrance Unified School District by Monday, as compared with an enrollment of 11,592 for 1954, officials reported this week.

RECREATION SUPERVISOR APPOINTED

Miss Marilyn Jensen, who worked for the South Gate Recreation Department for the past year, assumed the post of supervisor of Girls' and Women's Activities with the Torrance Recreation Department last week.

In addition to these duties, Miss Jensen will handle such activities as clubs, arts and crafts, drama, and sports.

Miss Jensen was born in Minot, North Dakota. She graduated from San Leandro high school, San Leandro, California and received her bachelor degree from San Jose State college, San Jose, California, in 1954.

Among elementary schools Carr, North Torrance, and Seaside showed the largest enrollment, reporting 1014, 1033, and 1025 students respectively.

Torrance high school, with an enrollment of 1310 students, edged out the new North high school by about 100 students, North high reporting 1202 students.

A few classrooms are still under construction at both Newton elementary school and North high school with completion expected in about two weeks.

The gym, music room, and cafeteria at North high school are expected to be completed around November, officials stated.

Here Are Instructions For Census

The third city census is now under way. A total of 88 enumerators are now canvassing the area. Estimates maintain that Torrance's population has increased from about 45,000 in 1950 to a present 65,000.

The new census is being taken in order to make Torrance eligible for additional State funds to which this city is entitled if it can show an increased population.

Individuals who do not expect to be home when the enumerators come are asked to leave a sealed envelope with the following information: name, age, sex, race, and relationship of persons in each household (wife, husband, child).

Information will be kept strictly confidential.

Narbonne Enrollment Totals 2355

Total enrollment at Narbonne high school so far this semester is 2355, constituting 145 more students than in 1954 when the figure stood at 2210, according to Principal Herbert Morey.

The anticipated total was 2400 students. The 2355 figure breaks down as follows: 1412 junior high school students and 943 senior high students.
