

Giant Parade, Armory Dedication, Public Dance Set for Saturday

Lt. Governor Powers To Attend Dedication

Largest display of military might in the history of Torrance will be parade Saturday, October 8, to mark the official dedication of the community's new National Guard armory.

Scores of marching units, bands, and military organizations will be interspersed with tanks, huge artillery pieces and other National Guard fighting equipment to give the city one of its most spectacular parades.

Guest of honor at the dedication will be Lt. Gov. Harold J. Powers of California, who will be brought from a legislators' luncheon of the California Republican assembly, Board of Directors meeting which is being held at the Hacienda hotel in San Pedro.

Lt. Gov. Powers is attending the 3-day convention here.

Celebrations will include the parade which will start at noon; the dedication of the armory at 1:15 p.m.; open house, 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.; and a public dance in the armory (Cabrillo and Lincoln) at 8 p.m. A square dance demonstration will precede the dance at 7:45 p.m. Men in uniform will be admitted free to the dance.

Route of March

The parade will start from Carson and Border avenue, proceed north on Cabrillo to Torrance boulevard, then up Post to Cravens, down to Cabrillo, and south on Cabrillo to the new armory.

A reviewing stand for dignitaries, both military and civilian, will be set up before the city hall.

Approximately 30 military units, including an estimated 2000 National Guardsmen, and 25 civilian groups of the Torrance area will take part in the huge parade through the downtown district, terminating at the new armory at 2505 Cabrillo avenue.

Civilian Division

A civilian division will precede the military division of the parade and will include the following: Torrance Mounted Police, Mayor Albert Isen, State Senator Richard Richards, Assemblyman Vincent Thomas, Torrance city councilmen, police and fire chiefs, Torrance high school band, Miss Community Fair, boy and girl scouts, American Legion, Miss Torrance, Retail Merchants' float, Fire Department, Chamber of Commerce, Junior Chamber of Commerce, Red Cross, Civil Defense, Torrance Area Youth Bands, Harvey Aluminum, and Longren, and Hermosa Beach officials.

A flight of jet fighters from California's Air National Guard will zoom past the reviewing stand at the end of the 1 1/2-mile-long parade.

Sound equipment will be furnished by General Petroleum, Torrance Recreation Department, and Five-Points Electric.

The community dance, starting at 8 p.m., is under the sponsorship of the Torrance Junior Chamber of Commerce and will feature music by Frank James and his band.
