He is survived by his widow, May Jeanne; three sons, Christopher Lynn, Stephen Michael and Dennis Ray; three brothers, Roland E., of San Pedro, Charles M., of Wilmington, and Robert E., of Garden Grove; and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Sellers, of Wilmington.

Sellers served for four years with the Marine Corps during World War II.
