Bible Study Fights Fear Says Speaker

"Unparalleled are the fears of this generation beginning in A.D. 1914." This was the declaration of C. W. Rieger of New York before an overflow crowd of nearly 2500 in attendance at the main lecture of the three-day assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses at the Forum theater. His subject was "Overcoming the Fears of this Generation."

"Many people," Mr. Rieger told his listeners, "fear their neighbors and what they will think. Others are scared of threats of nuclear war. Our problem," he continued, "becomes that of finding a way to overcome them." "The only remedy for fear-struck people," he added, will be Armageddon, which will remove all causes of fear."

Mr. Rieger urged all in attendance to engage in a regular study of the Bible and follow its counsel.

George Kezar, presiding minister of the Torrance congregation was one of the speakers at this gathering. He announced that 69 persons were baptized at this assembly.


After Friday, October 14, the 19th Annual Milk Bowl games will be held. Narbonne's team will play South Gate at South Gate at 3 p.m.
