Warriors to Tackle Renegades Saturday

El Camino college, co-leaders with Valley JC in the Metropolitan conference race with two victories, will tackle once beaten Bakersfield college in the Renegades' Memorial stadium Saturday night at eight.

The powerful Bakersfield eleven, rated the number one JC football team in the nation last week, dropped a 7-6 thriller to the Valley Monarchs Saturday night in its second conference tussle, after smashing Santa Monica in the college's conference opener, 34-6.

The Renegade grid machine had rolled up an impressive 161 points against 20 for its opposition in four straight victories before clashing with the Valleyites.

Meanwhile, back at the El Camino stadium, Coach Norm Verry and his "not rated in the top 20" Warriors held off a couple of San Diego scoring threats in the second half of their contest to edge the Knights, 13-0.

FOUR WINS
The Camino eleven defeated

East Los Angeles 20-6 in its Metro opener and now boasts an overall record of four wins and a tie.

In the San Diego conflict Jerry Nicholson, field general of the Warriors was asked to match his abilities against the Knights' hard running half-back, Art Powell. Both went into the game with 36 points.

Nicholson came through as he crashed over from the two yard line in the initial quarter for the first Warrior score and then set the stage for the second TD in the second period on a 20-yard pass play that put the pigskin on the Knights' three-yard line.

Fullback Don Kulpaca then plowed over for the score.

Nicholson, now boasting 42 points, will be asked to match

his abilities against the Renegades' top ground gainer and scorer, Jim Riley Saturday.

Riley, a fast breaking halfback who sometimes doubles at the "T" quarterback is another 42 point scorer.

COACHES
Records of two of the finest JV coaches in the Junior college field will also be at stake in this expected thriller.

Coach Norm Verry, who is starting his fourth season at El Camino, has compiled a record of 27 wins, 3 losses, and a tie, while Renegade Coach Homer Beatty, in his third year at Bakersfield, boast 24 wins against only 2 losses.

Verry's Warriors took the Metropolitan conference championship twice - in '52 and '54 - while Beatty's red and white squad won in '53.

Last season the Camino eleven trounced the Renegades 30-19 to win the Metro crown and get the Junior Rose bowl bid, but the year before lost to the Bakersfield team, 35-13 in its conference opener.

Thus both coaches claim a victory against the other. The '54 defeat of the Bakersfield squad by the Warriors could possibly be the main factor in their loss to Valley Saturday, as the Renegades found a lack of fire against the Monarchs with the Camino game next on its schedule.

Will appreciate it very much if you can print a letter of thanks for us in some conspicuous place in your newspaper next Thursday to enable us to publicly thank the many people who were of help to us last Sunday evening, October 9, as we do not know quite a few of the people by mail.

Our car was hit by a car driven by Harold Thomas of Hollywood Riviera while at 239th and Hawthorne and was completely demolished. We are most grateful for my husband's miraculous escape from death.

If the location is mentioned I am sure those we wish to thank will recognize the accident.

We are very grateful to Torrance Motorcycle Officers Bob Lewis and Al Jackson, who arrived on the scene immediately. Officer Jackson was especially kind and helpful in calming me down and putting me in a nearby car after I had fallen from our car onto the highway.

We feel we owe a lot to the two men who chased after our car after it went off the embankment, over two pieces of road equipment, and took off across a farm!

I kept screaming for someone to stop the car as my husband was unconscious in the front seat. I saw two men run down the embankment and run after the car, missing the door handles once, but succeeding in stopping the car the second time.

I then saw the same two men get together with some other men and pry open the driver's door, which had been caved in and jammed, so that my husband could be reached.

The motorcycle officers, a cruising car, doctor, photographer, and an ambulance all arrived within five minutes! The photographer seemed to

arrive on the scene immediately. (Would like to see his picture).

Our neighbors, Mrs. William G. Sheardown and Mr. and Bill West were wonderful in contacting relatives and caring for our children until they could be picked up by an aunt.

Mr. and Mrs. Nick Urban, relatives, were wonderful in keeping the children until we were able to leave the hospital several hours later, and in picking us up at the hospital and taking us home. The lady who shared her car with me until the ambulance came was also very kind.

Perhaps you can cut this down and still include thanks to all we wish to know! We feel we are exceptionally lucky to be alive, especially my husband, as no one can understand how we survived, so we do want to thank everyone, although it is hard to find the exact words to express our feelings.
